

The Quandary:

Obscurity or Renaissance

On June 24, 1857, Albert Pike delivered a St. John's Day address to Muscogee Lodge #93 in the Creek Nation, Indian Territory. This Lodge eventually became Eufaula Lodge No. 1. His words on that day still have significance for our Fraternity. On that occasion, Pike said:

"The rapid increase in the number of Masons has also efficiently aided in lowering the standard of Masonic excellence. The candidate receives little instruction and too often really remains standing in the northeast cor-

ner of the Lodge."

Notice in the year 1857, just after the ending of the Anti-Masonic period in America, near the beginning of the zenith of the growth in the number of Freemasons (and other forms of fraternalism) in this country, 100 years before the start of the decline in numbers in Freemasonry; facing the opposite of the current membership crisis in Masonry; fast increasing membership instead of dramatic decline, what does Pike lament? He decries the lack of quality of the masonic experience, so much so that he says, metaphorically, the initiate is left standing in the northeast corner, making no real progress in the mysteries of Masonry.

Pike goes on to say: "... the symbols remain unexplained, and are either not understood or misunderstood, ... and the members remain standing on the threshold of the inner Temple, whose golden doors continue



closed against them, and the true Masonic light forever hidden from their eyes."

It appears Masonry faces the same problem today regarding the quality of the masonic experience. Therefore, the relevance of Masonry in the lives of men and the decline in numbers, though very real, is a symptom - not the disease. Moreover, the rate of masonic membership decline is increasing, and those who understand statistical trends say the Fraternity is destined for extinction in the not-too-distant future. This extinction may occur in the lifetime of many members of the Fraternity today, certainly in the lifetime of those men who are currently being initiated into Masonry. If that trend is not slowed or reversed, masons today are facing the inevitable demise of the Fraternity.

Here is the quandary: though the statistics indicate Masonry is on the brink of obscurity, is it also possible that the Fraternity is on the verge of a renaissance? Perhaps the quality of the masonic experience can be improved for men who are now masons and the young men who may come into our Fraternity soon. Masonry likely has what thousands of young men today (known as millennials) seek.

Mark Koltko-Rivera, a Masonic scholar and author, says the first step in Masonic Resurgence is to "Repair the Temple," that is: "...we must improve the lodge experience, so that it better fulfills the promise that we make to men upon their initiation; the promise that Freemasonry will help them understand more about the great questions of life and that Masonry will help them become better men."

The critical question is how to improve the masonic experience. One of my favorite truisms is: "Keep the main thing the main thing." I also submit before we can improve the masonic experience, we in Masonry must define the main thing. Indeed, it is not an easy task. If one asks ten masons that question, there will be ten different answers. Can we say that we are better men having attended Lodge? What is the focus of our lodge meetings, reading the minutes, and paying the bills? All may be essential items, but not the main thing.

Perhaps, as Koltko-Rivera has suggested, the main thing in Masonry is contained in the simple and time-tested phrase: "making good men better." From that simple phrase flows the rest of the Masonic experience: Charity, Brotherly Love, Benevolence, and so on.

There are two apparent components in "making good men better." The first is one must start with "good men." Others have said it this way: guard the west gate. The first step in improving the quality of the masonic experience is the quality of the men who are allowed to petition and are accepted into our Fraternity. Good moral character must be first and foremost.

Almost one-half of the men who become Entered Apprentices in our state never finish. Pike would say we have left them standing in the northeast corner. More importantly, for those who have progressed through the degrees, how many remain in the northeast corner?

Back in 1857, Pike also had words for "seasoned" masons: "If a man having passed through the ceremonies of the three degrees, thinks that there is nothing further to be learned, and that to be an accomplished Mason, one need only accurately learn and fluently repeat certain phrases and set forms of words, he does not understand and appreciate Masonry. It may be useful to him, -it may even make him a better man; - but its true value is greatly beyond that which it has to him.

If a man, having assumed the obligations, and taken on himself the duties of a Master Mason, yet practically regards them as unreal; if he still continues to be narrow-minded, illiberal, intolerant, uncharitable; if he still cheat in trade, and make unfair bargains; or by winning it, take and use the money of his brother when it is not his own, because he has not earned it or given an equivalent for it; if he still wrongs his brother, and speaks evil of him; then he does not at all understand and appreciate Masonry; and it is of no value to him whatever."

Perhaps what Pike was saying then is just as relevant for us today as it was when he spoke it. As Master Masons, the critical item in "keeping the main thing the main thing" is that the great moral truths contained in our ritual must be applied in our lives. We must walk the walk as well as talk the talk. If we are to bring about a resurgence in masonic quality, Master Masons must redouble our efforts and commit to apply the great moral truths that our ritual teaches. That does not happen through osmosis; it requires quality masonic education as our focus.

Finally, let me close with Pike again: "To those who put a lower estimate on Masonry, and care nothing for its philosophy or history, nor appreciate the importance and dignity of its mission, it may indeed be useful. It may help them in their trade or business, it may save then when in danger, and afford them assistance when in want, and so may be of value. If it cause them to be more charitable, more forgiving, more tolerant, kinder and better husbands, fathers, brothers, sons, friends and neighbors, then indeed it is of great value; but still not of the greatest; unless, in addition to this, it leads them to the highest truth, and induces them to engage in the great work of human improvement and advancement, of which Masonry is the apostle."

Surely now, as in 1857, Pike's advice must be heeded, and Masonry can be as relevant in the future as it has been in previous times. When there is a quality, relevant masonic experience in the lives and hearts of Masons, we will not only "make good men better" but impact the world around us. And when that happens, membership issues will be solved as well. Freemasonry has done so in the past.

In the enlightenment of the 1600s, Freemasons changed the course of science through the Royal Society and charted the course of nations. In our country, the Founding Fathers, who were Masons, wrote the masonic principles of one man – one vote, freedom of assembly, freedom of religion and worship, freedom of speech, and freedom from the tyranny of state or church, into our country's constitution. This great republic and its experiment in democracy and representative government stands as a beacon to the world and a heritage to Freemasonry.

In the years following Pike's address in 1857, there was an explosion in fraternalism both in membership and benefit to humanity. From then until the 1930s, charities and hospitals were established. Civic and service organizations, such as Lions, Rotary, and Kiwanis, were all founded by Masons, and organizations such as the Boy Scouts and FFA were again begun by men who were Masons. All had and continue to have an influence beyond the walls of the Lodge.

Regarding the plight of obscurity or renaissance, I am convinced that Masonry can be at the forefront again. It is up to us. Today, the world needs what Masonry, what the Fraternity, can give:

A moral compass and anchor in a world awash in a sea of moral relativity.

A lesson in civil discourse in a world full of polarizing rhetoric.

A spiritual awareness in an ever-secularizing society.

A male figure mentor to a generation that might have grown up without one.

In summary, I think there are four things our Fraternity must consider if we are to solve our membership quandary and our future:

Keep the main thing the main thing.

Guard the west gate.

Apply the great moral truths of our ritual – Walk the walk as well as talk the talk.

Make Freemasonry relevant again outside the walls of the Lodge.


An Eye to the Future

reetings Brothers. Another busy year is about to come to a close, and progress has, and will continue to be, made by your Grand Lodge Trustees.

There have been several hot topics this year, and I would like to touch on a few of them briefly.

The first one I will touch on regards membership concerns and the statistics I have been asked about during my lodge visits. As for the statistics of where we have stood over the past ten years, I requested W. Stuart Lough, Assistant Grand Secretary, to run a report from Grandview that reflected a couple of different areas we should be paying attention to.

The first question addresses the natural attenuation of our membership population. How many of our brothers have put away their working tools in the last decade? That number is 7,284. Yes, that is an alarming number of deaths in our fraternity. There are no preventative measures we can take to address that issue.

The second question is how many new Master Masons we have raised in that same ten-year period. That number is 2,796. That number would have to increase 257% to break even with the number of brothers who have passed away. There are measures to be taken to improve this issue. I am not saying we run out and grab every man with a heartbeat and make him a Mason, but this can be addressed.

I truly believe in quality over quantity. But these numbers beg the question of how many potential good brothers we have left by the wayside because they left us without advancing. That, in turn, begs the question of why they left.

The third set of numbers is quite bothersome to me. How many Entered Apprentices have we initiated that failed to advance in that period? That number is 4,032.

Using raw numbers, had we kept those EAs interested and added them to the number of Master Masons raised, we would have approximately 6,828 Master Masons in that decade. That number would have nearly kept up with the number of brothers who passed away, and we would only be short by roughly 16%—a very easy number to achieve.

Membership numbers are just numbers, but what concerns me is how we have failed to keep 4,032 men.

Were we not guarding our West gate well enough, and we initiated men who were not ready or capable of becoming Masons?

Did we neglect these interested men and not truly mentor them, leaving them on the sidelines as strangers to a new organization they had no idea how to navigate on their own?

Did they get bored of paying the bills, planning a fundraiser, and getting no insight or education into the Craft they heard so much about?

Were they tired of the lack of harmony they were trying to escape in the outside world only to find in their new lodge?



I bet it is one or more of each thing on that list of questions.

We may not be able to fend off the loss by death, but we can certainly begin to correct the other losses we have incurred in membership.

I understand that society has changed. It has drastically changed over the years and more so in very recent years. Our society has become a "what's in it for me?" isolation of ourselves even in a crowd. Cell phones are looked at more often than a live human's face. Feelings get hurt at the drop of a hat, and most interactions between people are somewhat defensive or aggressive.

All that being said, what are the most valuable tools we have at our disposal

to start correcting the issues at hand?

In my opinion, the first order of business is to leave the outside world's negativity and single-mindedness outside our lodge buildings' doors.

We can do so by treating everything and everyone within our lodge building with the reverence of the Sanctum Sanctorum. It is a place of escape for brothers to feel a brotherly connection free from the burdens of outside work. Free from the harshness of personal piques, quarrels, and segregated cliques.

A place where we do what we have vowed to do in our obligations. A place where we can take off the masks we wear in the outside world, in business, and, in many cases, in public. Create an atmosphere of brotherly love, even for the brief time we spend in that lodge building a couple of nights a month.

Our Grand Master, MW John Carter, set that noble idea in motion with his motto, "Building A Civil Brotherhood." He not only set the idea in motion, but he also showed it to us all through his actions. His words and intent were not hollow. They should be heeded.

The second order of business, which can be built once we master the first one, is mentorship. We need genuine and honest connections with our new brothers and involve them in masonic education and fellowship.

MW Scott Vincent found and brought forth an amazing program that does wonders in guiding us to interact with new and old members alike. A vehicle that brings back common ground and fellowship and strengthens the bonds of brotherhood and education. That program is named "The Ashlar Program," and it has been successfully used in many other jurisdictions.

Brothers, I don't know how you feel about it, but I yearn for the return of a bonded and civil brotherhood. I yearn for the existence of that safe place, that sanctuary, that we call our lodge. That place is where we shut out the negativity and aggression of the outside world and look for peace within. That place to rediscover and practice all those things that brought us to masonry in the first place. A place where petty battles don't exist and the words and threats of "masonic charges" are a rare occurrence.

We can do this, Brothers. We can bring that all back. It costs nothing, and it brings great joy and peace of mind. That's what we came for, isn't it?

What say we give it a try?

I look forward to seeing you all at Grand Session on November 9th.

A CHANCE?

y Brothers, the first year as a member of the Grand Lodge Trustees is a learning year: learning how the Board works, learning about the Grand Lodge Budget, continuing to study our Constitution, and general personal Masonic growth. Here is what I have learned since our last Annual Communication:

1-The Grand Lodge Trustees function under and are tasked with maintaining the rules that the Craft vote for and establish in our Constitution, and therefore, have little arbitrary influence on a Constituent Lodge. That is as it should be. Each Constituent Lodge is generally autonomous if and until the Constituent Lodge fails to function in accordance with our Constitution.

2-There is very little money in the Grand Lodge Budget to pay for much other than expenses associated with the Grand Lodge building and keeping the office open, and that amount is decreasing annually. It seems that Constituent Lodges can make the same comment.

3-The vast majority of us are incredibly good-hearted and caring men across our Jurisdiction.

So, do we stand a chance? Yes, we do! We must learn to balance our revenues and expenses proactively. A Constituent Lodge has a much greater ability to do that than the Grand Lodge. A Constituent Lodge can structure its fundraising to benefit the lodge and a community organization much more quickly and easily than the Grand Lodge.

As all budgets get stretched hair-thin, increasing expenses and decreasing revenue becomes a simple math problem: decrease expenses and/or increase revenue. Expenses can be reduced to zero, meaning we meet in the freezing cold or the oppressive heat or have no separate place to meet. This method is first-order thinking, which is immediate, shallow, and superficial.

We have some lodges in Oklahoma that are financially well-off. Of concern are the lodges that are not. Annual dues are low, per capita is low, and recapitulation is low. That is a set-

up for financial failure.

In my home lodge, just over 50% of our living members are Perpetuals, so less than half of us pay annual dues. I would never tell another person how to use their discretionary funds, and every one of us has a say on whether our Fraternity survives financially.

Second-order thinking requires slower, more cautious, and more well-reasoned contemplation. What is the likely result of my decision in 10 years? Do I want my lodge to be here for my son or grandson? What value do I place upon our Fraternity? Am I willing to financially support my local lodge and the Grand Lodge at a level above what I already provide? I am unaware of any Brother who knowingly wishes to harm our Fraternity financially. (Many of us are doing so unknowingly). What are possible solutions?

Some possibilities I consider worthy include increasing regular revenue to our local lodge and Grand Lodge (through auto-debit from a credit card or bank account, just like other personal expenses). Perpetual members continue to pay their annual dues or at least pay \$25 to cover the per capita that the lodge pays to Grand Lodge; minimize the opportunity for Perpetual Pathway Programs and instead conduct Chance-To-Advance Programs (still a one-day program except we have a dues-paying Master Mason vice a perpetual member); changing the Perpetual Fund so that 100% of investment returns are not paid out (some portion remains to grow the corpus). If I were a dreamer, I would ask for donations to increase the endowed building fund to \$2,000,000 so that the investment returns cover the Grand Lodge building expenses each year instead of needing to be covered by the general operating budget.


Are there any or all of these possible solutions you can and will implement? If each of us takes personal responsibility for the success and survival of our Fraternity, our heyday lies in our future, not our past.

In his personal life he has been married to Jennifer for 20 years and has three adult children and three grandchildren.


In filing his application for the office of Grand Lecture he was asked:

2024 RESOLUTIONS

The following is an abbreviated version of the Resolutions and may not adequately capture the author's intent and message. For a complete copy of the Resolutions, click on the following link

RESOLUTIONS

Resolution 1 – Section 805 – Once a Brother has been raised to the Degree of Master Mason, he must wait either six months or test proficient on his Master Mason Categorical Lecture before he can petition any Concordant or Androgynous Body (Like Scottish or York Rites or the Shrine) – This Resolution would remove that restriction.

Resolution 2 - Section 214 – The Grand Lodge creates printed versions of the annual proceedings (Like the Grand Master's Address, committee reports, and so on). This resolution removes the mandate that these items be prepared in PRINTED form.

Resolution 3a & b – Section U 805 & 806 – Section 805 currently addresses the use of intoxicating liquors. Section 806 addresses the use of 3.2 beer. Resolution 3a strengthens the current language of U 805 by adding the additional wording of "beverages" (intoxicating liquors and beverages). Resolution 3b removes the outdated U 806 from the code.

Resolution 4a & b – Section 202 & 211 – One of the Grand Master's powers is to appoint Grand Representatives to other Grand Jurisdictions to aid in better communications. With the advent of mode readily available communication methods, the position of Grand Representative has become obsolete. These two resolutions remove the position of Grand Representative from the code.

Resolution 5 – Section 215 – This resolution would allow former District Deputy Grand Masters to carry the designation "Past" preceding their titles (as in, "May I introduce Past District Deputy Grand Master John Smith").

Resolution 6 – Section 502 – Currently, there is an assessment of \$17.00 for each candidate initiated as an Entered Apprentice. This resolution would raise that assessment by \$4.00 to \$21.00. Twenty dollars of the new assessment amount would be earmarked to the Grand Lodge Endowed Building Fund.

Resolution 7 – Section 706 – This resolution would allow for a simple majority recall vote of any member of the Masonic Charity Foundation of Oklahoma. Any recalled member could not apply for re-election during their unfinished term.

Resolution 8 – Section 901 – Currently, for a resolution to pass and come into effect, it requires a two-thirds majority of all the votes **CAST**. This proposed resolution changes the wording so that future resolutions must receive two-thirds of all the votes **REGISTERED** for the resolution to pass.


